





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Rebekah Elliott – 2 Projects: NSF DREAM & State-Wide Literacies Projects

Project 1 DREAM: A 4 year National Science Foundation project with K-12 multilingual teachers and students studying anti-bias mathematics education and professional learning opportunities. We are in year 2 of the project, studying how teachers, leaders, students, and communities support mathematics learning. We are working in dual language – Spanish programs.

Project 2 ALK-8: A 1.5 year project to support a state-wide network of educators' innovating through co-design to address education-related problems of practice. We are studying the capacity to build a state-wide effort that supports K-8 subject literacies (math, science, language arts, and more). We are just starting this project.

Project #1: Engaging Multilingual Families - Dual Language/ESOL Teachers connect with Authentic *Cariño*

Teachers Educating All Multilingual Students (TEAMS) at Oregon State:

- Funded through U.S. Department of Ed, Office of English Language Acquisition
- Prepares teachers to work with Multilingual learners in eight OR districts

TEAMS Community Goal: To deepen and sustain family and community engagement

How did TEAMS teachers' conceptions of *caring* and *connecting* support multilingual family engagement?

Teacher exemplar quote:

I've learned a lot, not only about myself, but also within the context of our studies that while I don't speak Spanish, I **could still connect with these families**. it's been a huge eye opener for me that I still have frustrating moments that I want to make relationships with these families in a way that I can't, and I need a translator to help with that... there's that hurdle, but I'm **figuring out ways** to find that support structure so that I can still make those relationships.... it's definitely been this switch



Conclusions

- 1. Coursework propels teachers to value and support engagement with families
- 2. Relationship-building is needed, as seen in times of crisis
- 3. Direct interactions are needed for listening, seeing, feeling with the families
- 4. Listening and observing first not only school's agenda
- 5. Multiple interactions with families needed, not one-time
- 6. Empathy and emotional engagement is a part of humanizing and authentic relationship
- 7. School systems *must* strategize and invest in teachers to spend time with families

Project #2: Mindfulness in Social Justice Education: Critical Race Feminist Perspectives

Social Justice and Mindfulness in Multicultural Education

- How does mindfulness help students learn about social justice?
- How does mindfulness help undergraduates and preservice teachers understand and heal from oppressive experiences?

Counter Story -Participant Exemplar: "The concepts that I learned from this week's mindfulness video were centered around being mindful about **belonging**. This is something that I have struggled with for a lot of my life, for reasons having to do with **bullying tied to racism**, as well as other things. This is something that I have to be mindful of on a daily basis because sometimes the **thoughts and feelings resurface** and I have to use mindfulness to be able to move through the emotions that are tied to that experience."
